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Grand Opening

Mustang Owner's Museum Planning a Grand Opening Bash

Get ready to rev it up with hundreds of your Ford Mustang owning friends. The Mustang Owner's Museum finally has set its Grand Opening schedule and it looks like they are planning a big bash.

The Mustang Owner's Museum plans to officially open for the 55th Anniversary of everyone's favorite pony car. The Museum will be a shrine to the Ford Mustang with examples and exhibits dating back to the 1964 Ford Mustang, the vehicle that really started the pony car era. With Ford already selling its 2019 Bullitt Mustang and planning a 2020 Ford Mustang Shelby GT500, Mustang is one of the longest continually-produced nameplates in history.

The National Mustang Owner's Museum has been open in a temporary or preview location while it has been building its permanent facility nearby. The Museum is scheduling its Grand Opening to coincide with Mustang's 55th birthday, in April of 2019.

Museum Grand Opening Events



The Museum is planning a 4-day event, April 17-20, 2019. The celebrations will be held in and around the museum, including a track event at the nearby Charlotte Motor Speedway. The Speedway hosted events for Mustang's 40th and 50th anniversary celebrations, so organizers say it is natural that some events would be scheduled there. The Mustang Owner's Museum is located in Concord, North Carolina, about a mile from the Charlotte Motor Speedway.

The celebrations include an open track event at the Charlotte Motor Speedway. Those events are extremely popular because they let registered owners take their vehicles out on the track to see how they perform. Typically, the events are held with some restrictions to insure everyone's safety, but they are great opportunities to let drivers see how their muscle cars truly handle in track situations.

Organizers are also hoping to set a Guinness World Record parade lap at the Charlotte Motor Speedway, hoping to get a record number of Ford Mustangs to participate. There will also be a parade lap on another day so that everyone who wants to just get the feel of driving on a race track can get in on the action.

They are planning a couple of big dinners or banquets, one establishing a "Hall of Fame" and also featuring guest speakers. Although they are not yet announcing who the speakers will be, in the past they have featured key Ford designers and engineers, as well as guest speakers from well-known Mustang customizers like Holman and Roush. Ford has also cooperated with the Mustang Owner's group providing speakers, exhibits, displays and suggestions over the years.

The week-end will also include a huge Mustang car show and contest.



MOTORING: ANSWERS TO YOUR DRIVING QUESTIONS

Here's what ought to get done in a brake job

Q: What in your opinion should a brake job consist of? On my cars and truck, I've had just the pads replaced, and sometimes the rotors turned or replaced, but never a caliper replaced. I've tried a new repair place, and they want to replace my rotors and install "loaded calipers." Is this over kill or necessary as a car ages? - Sean T.

A: Let's say a vehicle is ready for its first brake job at 46,000 miles (front wear sensors have begun to sing, rear brakes still look good). If there are no complaints of pedal pulsation or noise, the rotor surface finish looks good, and there isn't noticeable corrosion of components, a simple brake pad replacement will likely do fine.

This job would include inspecting rotor thickness, brake hoses and fluid level, and cleaning/ lubricating caliper slides and associated hardware. If brake fluid is more than three to four years

old flushing/renewal is recommended. With premium grade pads installed, the odds of repair success are perhaps 90 percent. The second brake job let's say at 90,000 miles, likely includes the rear pads or shoes as well. This time rotor finish is a little sketchy due to light scoring, glazing or some hard spots. Assuming rotor thickness is sufficient, machining (turning /refinishing) them is prudent. Replacement is overkill unless after-machining thickness is too thin. Replacement of caliper attaching pins, seals and so forth should also be considered unless they look really good. It's best to flush/renew brake fluid again. Repair success odds, due to additional variables, drops to perhaps 80 percent.

At the next brake job (130,000 miles?), it's possible the rotors have become worn and their surface finish has deteriorated due to heating issues because of their reduced thickness/mass, causing pulsation or noise. A second light machining may be all that's possible due to minimum thickness

rules, so replacement may be called for. My take on this is a slightly imperfect original equipment motor may actually be superior to a cheap replacement part. If rotors are to be renewed, step up and buy good ones! Repair success odds vary—see caliper opinion below.

Loaded calipers (remanufactured calipers with pads already inserted) are a nifty idea but, I think, overkill unless a vehicle is 10 or more years old, it's operated in a corrosive environment, or one of more calipers shows evidence of seepage. If the remanufacturer is QS-9000 certified and the pads included are of premium quality and fluid is renewed//bled, this is much preferred over rebuilding a caliper of replacing just one. The bottom line is caliper maintains fluid condition.

1966 Shelby GT 350... So it is!



elly Brown of New Smyrna Beach, Fl owns this stunning original example of a 1966 Shelby GT350 "Carryover" Mustang (SFM6S209). It's painted Wimbledon White with Guardsman Blue stripes as 250 of the 252 Carryover Shelby's were. Kelly found the car after much searching, researching and eventually finding this Shelby, and verifying its authenticity. This Shelby is well documented and its authenticity is verified by Howard Pardee - the registrar of the Shelby American Automobile Club.

This Shelby is a matching numbers 1966 GT350! It retains the original 289 Hi-Po engine, 4 speed T-10 transmission and 9 inch rear end. Perhaps the most important aspect of this Shelby is that it has its original rust free body having lived its life in Texas under the careful ownership of two NASA engineers and one Oil engineer. This Shelby was purchased new by a NASA engineer in the Houston area. This owner enjoyed the car for its intended purpose of racing. He drag raced it on the weekends! When he decided to sell the car he sold it to his friend - who was also a NASA engineer. Eventually it was bought by a well known Shelby broker and sold to an Oil Engineer who had no time for the car. Kelly Brown is the fourth owner of this GT350.

GT350 Shelby's are held today in high regard and highly sought after by collectors. Carroll Shelby built 562 1965 Shelby Mustangs. They were street legal race cars with extensive modifications. Shelby bought Mustangs from Ford with 289 Hi-Po engines and then in Venice, California he worked his magic on them, installing modifications that would make them very fast race cars. Shelby's creation was a long way from the "secretary's car" envisioned by Jacocca and the Ford bosses. Instead it was a Thoroughbred!

The Shelby here is a 1966 Carryover GT350. It has a 1965 Ford vin number and a 1966 Shelby vin number! How can this be? Easy, in late 1965 Shelby delivered 252 1965 Mustangs with 289 Hi-Po engines. The 1965 GT350's were considered a little too "racy" with mods that included a battery in the truck that caused problems including battery fumes in the passenger compartment. So Shelby was considering softening the 1966 cars with more street friendly mods.

Remember, these cars were built with no A/C, no power steering, no power brakes, no power windows, just a solid lifter high performance 289 V-8! She was built to run! And run she does, she is a beast to drive! Wrap yourself in the original Ray Brown competition seatbelts and start up the engine and right away you hear the loud V-8 lope of the engine. The clutch is stiff and it is unforgiving to the novice. It is easy to stall and is either in or it is moving forward and fast! It is a Monster to drive but totally exciting! His First drive was a bit unnerving, but left him wanting MORE!

The Carryover Shelby's have the "go fast" mods of the 1965 cars and the "looks" of the 1966 cars as follows:

CARRYOVER 1965 FEATURES:

1965 Upholstery, all smooth including door panels and hardware

1965 Radio block off plate

1965 Glove box with no 4 way flasher switch in glovebox

1965 Vin tag and style

1965 Date codes on all parts

1965 Engine and drive train with black painted engine and tags

Lowered a-arms (after 6s253 no 1966 Shelby had lowered "a" arms)

Override traction bars

15 Inch wheels

Fiberglass hood with steel frame

There are many 1965 smaller mods on the Carryover Shelby's but the above items are the most important.

THE FOLLOWING ARE THE 1966 MODS THAT ALL CARRYOVER SHELBYS HAVE:

1966 Grille

1966 Functional quarter windows

1966 Gt 350 gas cap

1966 "Cobra" tach mounted on top of dash

1966 Simulated woodgrain deep dish mustang GT steering wheel

1966 Rear shelf with no back seat only 95 of the carryover cars had the "package

shelf" instead of the back seat

The instrument bezel is completely unique to the carryover 1966 Shelby's

Other goodies on this car include BF Goodrich Comp T/A 225/60R15's tires, and a Hurst competition plus shifter handle.

Kelly is a retired engineer (Director of Environmental Engineering for Global Ford) for over 33 years. He is a car enthusiast to the core. A 65 K code 4 speed Mustang convertible, '07 Shelby GT500, 2012 Boss Laguna Seca, 2016 GT 350 Shelby, a modern twin to this 1966 GT 350, and even a '31 Model A Deluxe Roadster are a few of the toys in his massive garage.

I asked Kelly how in the world does he get this car to some of the car shows and cruise in's that he goes to? He says emphatically that he DRIVES it! Kelly tells me "Carroll Shelby always said they were meant to be DRIVEN, not trailer-ed". So he drives it!..... And so IT IS!
